1994 ROBERTS REUNION

Just five weeks after the Linnell Family Reunion in Granville, Ohio, the descendants of Clyde Franklin Roberts (118,241,116,23) held a reunion in Minneapolis, MN. It was a wonderful four day event - as all family reunions seem to be. A total of 84 people attended the events during the four days of the reunion. Relatives came from 13 states: Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, Wyoming, Colorado, Tennessee, South

Dakota, Oregon, Washington, Oklahoma, Arizona, and Texas. A large map of the United States was tacked to a wall and people stuck pins into the map to indicate the place that they had come from. It drew a lot of interest. There were lots of hugs and picture taking as people from all over the United States arrived. Some of the parents and children were getting together as a group for the first time in many years. It was enjoyable to see 2nd and 3rd cousins realize how much family to which they belonged. About 75 people were housed and fed at the homes of Glen Roberts (118,241,116,231,3) in Crystal, MN, Virginia "Ginny" Roberts Hayes (118,241,116,231,34) in Andover, MN, and Lori Larsen Holmgren (118,241,116,231,14) in Fridley, MN. James (Jim) Orlando (118,241,116,238,2) of White Bear Lake, MN also hosted two of his sisters from Oklahoma.

The official reunion was scheduled to begin on Friday, July 29. But already on Thursday, July 28, 34 people were at the home of Glen and Marcia Roberts for the evening meal. There was a lot of talk and planning going on that evening in preparation for the next four days of fun and activities.

Friday's activities centered around the home of Glen and Marcia Roberts (Marcia was the real spark plug of the reunion). Many people chose that day to visit the Mall of America and other areas in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul. but there were still large groups of people under the trees, in the garage, on the deck, and in the house, visiting and talking. And let's not forget the many children that were playing with their cousins, on the swings, in the tree house, in the Family Room and chasing each other around the yard. Many of them having just met for the first time. Friday evening there were 58 people present for the evening meal.

Friday night Wayne Hansen (118,241,116, 231,52) arrived at the airport on a late flight from Tucson, AZ. Some 13 or 14 of his 1st cousins left their children with spouses and went to the airport to meet Wayne. The cousins were holding up signs greeting Wayne, and one of the fellows getting off the plane said that if Wayne didn't show up, he would be happy to be Wayne! A couple of other people stayed around to see who this "Wayne" person was. Finally, Wayne got off the plane and was overwhelmed to have such a great homecoming. We heard stories of cousins staying up that night until

5:00 in the morning, talking and getting reacquainted.

Saturday and Sunday, July 30 and 31, events moved to the home of Ginny (daughter of Glen Roberts) and Chuck Hayes. They have an acre of land and every bit of it was used by the group for trailer parking, vehicle parking, volleyball, croquet, horseshoes

horseshoes, axe throwing, campfire circle, meals, and, course, of the groups of visiting relatives. The house has three full baths, and there seemed to be lines at each bathroom all day long. Saturday morning a number of family members attended services at

the Anoka Seventh Day Adventist Church. At lunch time, 12 dozen ears of sweet corn were brought in and roasted in charcoal pits. Along with the hamburgers and home baked beans, it was a wonderful meal. Someone counted 75 people served at the noon meal and 77 served at the evening meal. A number of people had brought craft items to display. There was much interest expressed in these items and many hours in the afternoon were spent looking and discussing. An impromptu watermelon spitting contest by children and adults developed after watermelon was served at the evening meal. Singing and visiting around the campfire in the evening was another event that was enjoyed by some cousins until 3:00 a.m., we were told.

In between times, great grandchildren were listening to octogenarians Lyman (oldest child of Clyde) and Thelma Roberts tell stories about pioneer days. The I ma was remembering how she had ridden in a covered wagon across the prairies of Kansas when she was a



Kansas when she was a little girl. Lyman told about working in lumber camps and the winters in northern Minnesota. Lloyd Roberts (6th child of Clyde) had several family members there and talked about events from the 1930's and 1940's. Three children of Vivian Roberts Ross (8th child of Clyde - Deceased) were there, too. Family groups got together in the afternoon for picture taking. Lyman and Thelma had the largest group, with over 60 descendants in attendance.

Another cousin, Roger Hansen (118,241, 145,131,1S) spent most of the day taking video pictures which resulted in a quite professional looking 1 hour 34 minute video tape of the day's activities. How enjoyable it is to have something like that to watch and remember the good times together. Vicki Roberts Crandall (118,241,116,231,32) daughter of Glen Roberts) of Wausau, WI, has made many copies of the tape for family members that requested them.

Sunday was a day of scheduled activities for the children led by Douglas (Doug) (118,241,116,231,31) son of Glen Roberts and Janet Roberts. A family history scavenger hunt was one of the more interesting games. Children were given lists of questions to ask their relatives. For instance: Who once lived in a log cabin?, Who grew up using an outhouse for a bathroom?, Who farmed with horses?, etc. Some of the children were overheard to say, "I didn't know that!," referring to their parents or grandparents. Other fun games were a water-filled balloon toss, three-legged races, and chalk drawings on the driveway for the younger children. Steve Hansen (118,241,116,231,71) with a Master of Arts degree from Notre Dame University, judged the chalk drawings. Everyone received a prize, among them awards for the best use of a single color, the most imaginative drawing, the best use of space, the prettiest landscape, the best abstract art (by a 3 year-old), etc. All in all, it was a lot of fun and the weather was great. At the award presentations, bags of pasta that were in the shape of the State of Minnesota were given to those that came from out of state.

Sunday evening, quite a few people had to leave. One of the 10 year olds was observed sitting in the car just before driving off with tears running down her cheeks and dripping off her chin because she had to leave her cousins after having had SUCH a good time.

Many others scattered on Monday, August 1. Some to visit Lake Superior. Some on their way home. Some to continue on with their vacations. For the evening meal at Lori and Rob Holmgren's place, only about 20 people were left. It was a tired but happy group that played table games that evening.

The "50/60 something" group is

debating whether they want to do this kind of thing again in the future because it took a lot of planning and work. But the best thing that we have heard is that some of the "30 something" group is talking of putting on a reunion again in three years. I do like what has been started! Glen Roberts

SHARE A FAMILY STORY

James M. Linnell (11a, b15, 844, 23) shares the following about his greatgrandfather James Crosby Linnell.

James tells of a box of "stuff" that came into his possession after the death of his father. The box

contained family pictures, (many with short notes on the back) family letters, and a sheet of paper on which his grandfather had written out what he knew about the family. Later a book entitled "Illustrated History and Biographical Record of Lenawee County Michigan."

After studying the "stuff" and the book, James tells us the following: (1) Every one in Lenawee County was well esteemed, had been eminently successful, was extremely devout, and had a flawless pedigree. Secondly, no one, and I mean NO ONE, In Lenawee County knew how to smile.

According to a note on the back of a picture, James learned that his great grandfather, in his prime, could have doubled for U.S. Grant, and in later life he could have doubled for one of the Smith Brothers on the cough drop box. (shown on page 208 in Rachel's 1994 book "DRL").

James, a member of the elusive Jonathan line (11a,b15) has interesting comments about this family connection. The following is his story: Rachel's book The Descendants of Robert Linnell had arrived in his mail. James says, "As you know the history was well documented and worth the price. Or was it? I glanced through the book and found that I was a 11a,b115 something. Reading further I found that this 'a,b' business meant that I couldn't prove that I was a real 'Linnell.' It seems that way back somewhere there were three Jonathans and only two can be properly accounted for in the Linnell lineage.

"Guess which Jonathan my branch of the family comes from? If my blood line came from a colorful character or a nefarious scoundrel, at least that would be something I could rationalize and talk about. Instead, maybe I am just James M. Linnell. These people, my ancestors, were Puritans, went to church for a whole day and kept meticulous records about everything. This concept brings to mind many questions. How did they lose a whole person? Is the lack of records concerning the third Jonathan accidental or was it intentional? Do the '11a,b15's' really want to know the rest of the story?

"At least Rachel was being kind; she did include my family in the book with an explanation that there was better than an even chance that the "a,b's" probably did belong. This was not a crushing blow, but the fact did remain that my great-grandfather had been a common peddler, my great-

great grandfather had been a shoemaker, and my great-great something might not have been a Linnell."

James goes on to say, "It is with great regret that I have not had the opportunity to meet a woman whom I've grown to respect and to whom all family members owe a very deep debt of gratitude for the monumental task that she so faithfully and carefully carried out. If it had not been for Rachel's untiring efforts, much of what is now known about our family would have been lost forever."

CONFUSION CLARIFIED ABOUT TWO PRISCILLA ROGERS

The Historian General of the Mayflower Society, Caroline Lewis Kardell, reports in the May, 1994 edition of "The Mayflower Quarterly" the correct identity of Priscilla Rogers who married our Thomas Linnell 11a,b12. We admit that we did not know that there was a question about her ancestry, but the Mayflower Society discovered it in the applications for membership in the Society. Both Priscillas, one from Plymouth and one from Harwich, were descendants from the Mayflower lines of Thomas Rogers and Samuel Hopkins, but through different marriages and lines. Any of the Linnells trying to achieve membership in the Mayflower Society could run into problems in finding the direct line as we have expressed it in The Descendants of Robert Linnell, so we hasten to show the corrected line as researched by Caroline Kardell.

The lineage of our Priscilla Rogers as descendant from Thomas Rogers is: Priscilla was the dau. of Joshua Rogers, Joshua was the son of Egenezer Rogers, Ebenezer was the son of John Rogers, John was the son of John Rogers, John was the son of John Rogers, John Rogers who was the son of Joseph Rogers who was the son of Thomas Rogers, the Pilgrim.


The lineage of Priscilla Rogers as descended from Stephen Hopkins is: Priscilla was the dau. of Joshua Rogers, Joshua Rogers was the son of Hannah (Cook) and Ebenezer Rogers, Hannah (Cook) was the dau. of Richard Cook Richard Cook was the

son of Deborah³ (Hopkins) Cook, Deborah³ was the dau. of Gyles² Hopkins who with his father Stephen¹ Hopkins came to this country on the Mayflower.

This information not only corrects the material on p. 164 in the book, but also in the Appendix I pp. 475-480. We are grateful to Randa Mammarella for sending this information along to us. A friend had sent it to her upon recognizing the Linnell name and its connection to Randa. Persons who are interested in the entire research will find it in the "Mayflower Quarterly," May 1994, pp. 115-116.
