


Treasurer's Report






The Gravestone Fund

In Appreciation of Jerry Linnell

Jerry Linnell, presiding at the final meeting in 2006 of the Linnell Family Association at the Four Points Sheraton Hotel at Eastham, MA, spoke these words from his heart, "This Linnell Family means so very much to me." For the past nine years Jerry has been the face of our Linnell Family Association. He called us to order in Alexandria Bay, NY in 2000. He called us together in Black River Falls in 2003 and again this year at Cape Cod. And now he will continue this responsibility for the next three years to help us strengthen our determination in this, our Linnell Family Association.

It isn't that Jerry has time to do this. As Chief Reporter of Debate of the U.S. Senate, he and his staff of specialists record all of the public words spoken in the Senate and publish them in the Congressional Record. This requires enormous planning and executing. In addition Jerry is the father of four, a grandfather, a brother, and counts his base family to be located in northern Minnesota.

Jerry's first Linnell Family Reunion was at Cape Cod in 1997. But I had met him in the 1980's. I was making Linnells connections with Minnesota, in Florida, in Chicago, wherever we traveled, so had called Jerry in Washington D.C. when visiting family in that area. Jerry invited me to meet him in D.C. and took me to lunch at the Senate dining room, a delightful experience so long ago. So when Jerry showed up at that Cape Cod Reunion in 1997 I could greet him as an old Family friend. Dick Linnell, our Chairman at that time, asked him to take on chairing the

Association and Jerry responded that he would, with our help. Since that time, Jerry's position has been "Work with me and we will go forward."

It was Jerry who introduced the concept of a Scholarship Award to be given to one of our Linnell High School Seniors each year. And this year, with Jerry's urging, the Linnell Association raised this award to \$1,000 for the High School Senior winner of an essay contest. Jerry's support of young persons has been evident in his leadership of this award.

We salute Jerry Linnell for his faithfulness, his creative leading, his belief in the Linnell Family, and his hopes for its future.

And my friends have no story to compare. Of course, I am only beginning my speech about Colonial New England and may ramble on about David Linnell's controversial marriage. Married to Hannah Shelley on

March 9th, 1652 and neglecting to petition Hannah's parents, David and

Hannah were cut off from the church and publicly whipped. Amos Odis records, "They were both, by the sentence and joint consent of the church, pronounced to be cutt off from that relation which they hadd formerlye to the church by virtue of their parents covenaunt." This is a bite of real, enjoyable, succulent history, and The Descendants of Robert Linnell documents it for me, complete with old and odd spelling intact. Written just under my fingers is credible history revolving around my ancestors. I could never dream to learn this in a class or textbook; however, it is conveniently on my shelf.

Historic Linnell Photos at the Cape Cod Reunion

There were many wonderful displays at the June 2006 reunion. For me, one of the best was the wonderful array of photos that Dan McConnell shared with everyone. There were photos of the houses on the Cape where Linnell ancestors had lived to go with the self-guided tour that was available. There were photos of the churches in England where Penninah Linnell worshiped and where Rev. Lothrup preached.

My favorites were the photos of people, taken from an old photo album, which featured Thomas Jefferson Linnell and his descendants. Of course my interest stemmed from his relationship to my wife, Kay. Thomas Jefferson Linnell was my wife's Great-Grandfather. His history is well documented on page 337 of Rachel Wynn's book, The Descendants of Robert Linnell. The eighth child of Samuel Linnell (of Grindstone Island) Thomas Jefferson took his wife, Mary Thorn Linnell and their

family west to a farm in Illinois, going part of the way by steamboat on Lake Eric. (Dan McConnell had a small chest of drawers, which made the trip with them on display at the reunion.) Thomas Jefferson's older brothers, Samuel and Rufus, had moved to Illinois a year prior to Thomas Jefferson. After his first wife died Rufus married Caroline Thorn, sister of Mary.

There were many more pictures on display, pictures of Thomas J. Linnell's children and grandchildren. One picture even has a picture of my mother-in-law as a small child, held by her mother. Kay had never seen that picture of her mother before. All of these pictures were on display as well as being available on a CD. Corrections to "Westering Pioneer Honored," from the February '06 LFA Newsletter

The new gravestone erected in the Pleasant Grove Cemetery in Greene, Iowa, was to correct the fact that the name of Sarah J. Welton, the great

grandmother of the subscribers, had not been inscribed on the original monument. The new monument also listed the names of the two sisters: Lillian, died 1891, and Ella, died 1884, and Sarah's husband, Joseph D. Linnell. The original stone, bearing the names of Joseph Linnell, Lillian and Sarah still remains on the cemetery plot.

An error in the names of the subscribers also appears. Loie Long Linnell should

have read Loie Linnell Long, 118,241,145,852. And the name Judy Heilig Harms, 118,241,145,1016 should also have appeared.

Mavis also adds that Herbert and Sada were born in Wisconsin.
