Presidents Obama and Bush Related to The Westering Linnells

Robert Linnell, our common ancestor, migrated from Scituate, MA to Barnstable, MA in 1639, along with many other members of the congregation of the famous minister Rev. John Lothrop. As a whole, this group fled England to find religious freedom in the New World.

Among these families, many of whom stayed in Barnstable for generations, were the families of Hinckley, Davis, Cobb, Robinson, Sturgis, Scudder, and many more. Thomas Hinckey, who would have been a friend and neighbor to Robert and Peninah Linnell, became Governor of Plymouth Colony. Isaac Robinson also their friend and neighbor, was the son of Rev. John Robinson, the leader of the Pilgrims that came on the Mayflower. From this small community, and their inter-marriages, descend all of us in the Linnell Family of America, and so also do George H.W. Bush, George W. Bush, and, through his mother's family, Barak Obama. All Linnells whose numbers start with 118,24 are direct blood relatives of both Bushes and Obama. How we are related is spelled out in an excellent new book "Ancestors of American Presidents" by Gary Boyd Roberts of the New England Historical and Genealogical Society.

Most of the Linnells who migrated West, are descended from John Linnell [118], and his son, Samuel [118,2] and grandson, Samuel [118,24]. Many of this line went to Maine, then Upstate New York, then the Midwest, including the sons of Samuel Linnell of Grindstone Island, NY who went to Northern Illinois, the site of our next reunion. Linnell Family Association Scholarship Fund (LFASF)

We are pleased to invite Linnell family students to apply for award of the Linnell Family Association Scholarship Fund. The Linnell Scholarship Fund was established in 2000 with a donation of \$500 and has continued to grow since then.

Who can apply? Any high school senior or current student of a college or an accredited higher education program, who is a descendant of Robert Linnell, is eligible to apply for the scholarship. Student applicants are asked to write an essay of not less than 1,000 words, nor more than 2,500 words in length, which should be typed and double-spaced. The essay should involve Linnell family history or current positive influences of the Linnell family. One winning essay will be selected this year for the scholarship award of \$1,000.

How do students apply? Students should mail their original essay along with: the LFASF Scholarship Application form; two letters of recommendation (one from a teacher of the applicant and one from a member of the applicant's community); and a current academic transcript.

When are essays and applications due? Students wishing to enter their essay for the LFASF award must have their application and accompanying essay sent by the extended date, <u>April 15</u>, 2009.

How are the essays judged? The Linnell Family Association Scholarship Fund Administration Committee (LFASFAC) has been established and will oversee the selection and judging of all prospective scholarship award recipients.

We invite all Linnell cousins to come to the next Linnell Family Reunion to be held in Rockford, IL June 26-28, 2009 at the Holiday Inn, 7550 East State Street [Business US 20], in Rockford. It will be great fun, meeting and reacquainting ourselves with Linnell cousins from all across America. The theme of the reunion will be *The Linnell Pioneer Experience*, a celebration of those Linnell families who were pioneering settlers of the Midwest in the mid 1800s.

One of the highlights of the reunion will be a private guided tour of the Midway Village [the old name for Rockford], a wonderful re-creation of the pioneer life of an actual Illinois village of the period. Real stores, shops, houses, barns, and a church from the area have been moved and reassembled to form an authentic village, just as the Linnell pioneers would have known it. The houses and shops have been restored and furnished in the period. The church is actually used for weddings.

Additionally, we have located farms of Linnells and Linnell kin such as the Tofflemires [of Music Man fame], Sewells, Goughs, Coveys, Glass's, and Sees. We will provide maps and directions to find these farms as well as to the Belvidere Museum, which holds items of Linnell interest.

The Holiday Inn is on the Eastern most edge of Rockford, adjacent to I-90/I-39 to Wisconsin and Chicago. There is regular bus service from O'Hare International Airport just 60 miles away that will drop you off right at the Holiday Inn. Near to the Holiday Inn is the Clock Tower Resort with its new Water Park, that is open to the public. Right next to the Hotel are two restaurants that we will use during the reunion - the Hoffman House and the Thunder Bay Grill. Your alert planning staff has tried them both and we approve!

Please plan to join us at the reunion! You can book rooms at the Holiday Inn now for the 26th and 27th [Friday night and Saturday night] at the group rate of \$129.95 per night. The hotel phone number is [815]-398-2200. Mention the Linnell Reunion. There will be more to come on the reunion as the date gets closer, so please set aside the dates.



Eagle Wing Prints Available Again!

One of the most popular things available from the Linnell Family Association has been the beautiful art print of the famous clipper ship, Eagle Wing, Ebenezer Harding Linnell, Master. This 19th Century sailing ship, under Captain Linnell, still holds the world record for the fastest time from London to Hong Kong. From historical records, the LFA commissioned a well-known Cape Cod artist, Milton Welt, to do an oil painting of the ship under full sail.

For the 2006 Linnell Reunion on Cape Cod, we had 50 numbered and signed art prints made, and they sold out quickly. Now we are having 25 more made, which will be numbered 51-75. If they sell out we may have one final run of 25 made, but that will be the final run. We reserved 100 numbers and that will be all that are ever made.

Our Ancestor - Robert Linnell Where DID He Come From?

Recent research has shed some new light on the life of our common ancestor, Robert Linnell, who came with his wife, Peninah Howes Linnell, to America in 1638 to rejoin themselves with their Pastor and brother-in-law, Rev. John Lothrop, one of the most famous and important ministers to come to America. As you know, they first settled in Scituate, MA, then moved with most of the congregation to Barnstable, MA on Cape Cod in 1639. He was called Mister Linnell, a title usually reserved for ministers and landed gentry. We don't know why, but it's interesting.

Some early histories of Cape Cod identified Robert's wife as Jemimah Howes Linnell, which has resulted in much confusion, and the idea that Robert probably would have married her in County Kent, and perhaps came from Kent himself. This Jemimah was supposedly the daughter of Rev. John Howes of Egerton and Eastwell, Kent. In fact, the records of Rev. Howes children are clear. His first daughter, Hannah, was baptised in 1594 (and married Rev. John Lothrop in 1610). His second daughter was our Peninah, baptised in 1596. None of his other children were named Jemimah.

We find Peninah still unmarried in 1632, along with her brother Samuel, Rev. Lothrop and 39 others being arrested and jailed for "meeting in conventicle", which meant a private meeting to hear unlicensed preaching, which was illegal. We know now that Rev. Lothrop's congregation had no church building but met in several members houses at various places in London and Southwark, across the Thames River. Some 60 years later, when such church groups were no longer illegal, the remnants of the congregation built a church in Southwark.

In the recently discovered records of Rev. Lothrops congregation, we find the entry that "Robert Linnell and wife" were granted admission into the church in 1634. This could be Peninah or some unknown first wife. But either way, Robert probably met Peninah in London, not in Kent.

So where did he come from? We find a family of Linnells (but no Robert) in St. Olave Parish inSouthwark in the 1620's. Perhaps they are related.

We also find an intriguing court record in the 1620's of a Robert Linnell, having his horse stolen in the Whitechapel section of London. This Robert Linnell is said to be " of Weedon Bec". Now keep in mind that Linnell never has been a common name in England, and Robert Linnell even less so. Weedon Bec is a small village in Northamptonshire (some 50 miles north of London), the only place in England where the name Linnell is fairly common. This Robert [with the stolen horse] seems to have died a few years later, but we find other Robert Linnells in that time and area that we are still trying to sort out.

At an earlier time some of these Linnells were ministers and graduates of Cambridge. They are interesting but we can't yet prove the link.

One would think in this internet age that all the public records are available on line, but much information in England still lies in dusty parish attics and local records offices. Perhaps we will find the origins of our Robert someday. We'll keep trying. Stay tuned!
